Nicole Mozee advocates for civil liberties, civil rights, and social justice. Committed to equitable change and public interest, she has the distinguished honor of serving as an inaugural faculty member at the newly established Wilmington University School of Before joining the law Law. school. Professor Mozee worked as Deputy а Attornev General for the Delaware Department of Justice Division of Civil Rights and Public Trust. In this role, she investigated and prosecuted civil rights violations, including hate crimes, public official misconduct, law enforcement useof-force cases, and housing discrimination. Deputy Attorney General, Professor As successfully Mozee prosecuted the Division's first hate crime conviction and the State's first-ever conviction of a sitting elected official.



Nicole Mozee, Esq. Assistant Professor of Law, Wilmington University School of Law

Prior to the Delaware DOJ, Professor Mozee worked in government and policy, family law, and employment discrimination. Nicole worked as Associate Legal Counsel for Governor John Carney, Staff Attorney at Delaware Volunteer Legal Services, Inc., and a Labor Enforcement Officer for the Delaware Dept. of Labor Office of Anti-Discrimination. She also previously taught undergraduate courses on legal ethics and Constitutional Law.

Professor Mozee is an active member of the Delaware State Bar Association and has held several leadership roles, including serving as Chair of the DSBA's annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King. Jr's Breakfast and Day of Service. Additionally, she is actively involved with the Delaware Barristers Association and the American Constitution Society of Delaware. Professor Mozee holds several board positions for non-profit organizations and has authored publications on diversity, equity, and social justice. She serves the community by participating in outreach and advocacy efforts on various issues, including public policy, hate crimes education, fair housing, disability rights, employment discrimination, criminal justice reform, and voting rights. Professor Mozee has been recognized by various local and national organizations for her work, including being honored by the Delaware Business Times as a Top 40 Under 40 Professional in 2019. She is also a Newark NAACP branch member! Nicole graduated from the University of Delaware (B.A. in Political Science and Spanish Studies) and New York Law School (Juris Doctor).

Janet has represented and served the Delaware community locally, regionally, and nationally for over fifty-plus years. She is a community activist and proud mother of three children, Patrice, Stephen, and Eboni. Janet earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Delaware State University, a Master of Instruction Degree from the University of Delaware, and a Principal's and Supervisor's Certification in Education from Wilmington University. She taught elementary education in the Delaware public school system and at Delaware Technical Community College. Currently, she substitutes for New Castle County Vo-Tech District.

Janet is the first and only African American to own a floral shop on the Wilmington Riverfront. She is the first and only African American to be appointed to the Board of Charitable Gaming Commission by Governor Jack Markell. She served on the Boards

of Delaware State University's National Alumni Association, Delta Outreach and Education Center, Inc., and the New Castle County Jack and Jill of America. A former President of the Delaware Chapter of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women (NCBW). She is an Emeritus member of NCBW-SNJ Chapter. Janet was appointed to the National Coalition of 100 Black Women's National Nominating Committee. Janet is also a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., where she was elected to the Regional Nominating Committee in 2016.

Janet continues to serve her community, chairing the Newark NAACP's Nominating Committee and Delaware State University New Castle County Alumni Association Nominating Committee for their last two election cycles. She is an active Board member of the African American Heritage Institute and advocates on behalf of black people and people of color unapologetically. For over 12 years, she has attended the NCBW's Legislative Days in Washington, DC, sharing the mission, "advocating on behalf of black women and girls to promote leadership development and gender equity in the areas of health, education, economic empowerment, and social justice." She also meets with Delaware legislators, sharing and advancing an agenda that represents the needs of black women and girls in Delaware.

AWARD DESCRIPTION: An award of the highest esteem. Awarded to a person or persons who have served their community and been recognized locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally. This nominee embraces NAACP's mission to achieve equality, political rights, and social inclusion by advancing policies that expand human and civil rights, eliminate discrimination, and accelerate the wellbeing, education, and economic security of Black people and all persons of color.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT NAACP WINNER: RICHARD WILLIAMS, SR.

His motto: "Let the work I've done speak for me."



Richard "Ricky" Williams Sr. has been a prominent member of the NAACP since 2006. He is a Lifetime Silver Member and has successfully served the NAACP in many capacities, including founding the M.O.T. branch in Middletown, DE. He currently holds 2nd Vice President and Labor Chairperson positions in the Newark, DE Branch NAACP. In addition, Ricky has served on the Executive Committee, Political Action Committee, Community Coordination Committee, and Freedom Fund Committee and a former State Conference Executive Board member.

In addition to serving the NAACP, Ricky is also a member of the Delaware Coalition of Black Trade Unionists (CBTU). He

currently holds the position of Region 2 Executive Board and serves as the chapter's Vice President. In this capacity, Ricky exemplifies the same passion and leadership skills as in the NAACP for improving the lives of people, particularly those who are disadvantaged or not fairly represented. As an astute follower of politics and government in the State of Delaware, Ricky has been on the frontlines of some of the most pressing civil rights issues of our time. He has been dedicated to civil rights, social justice, and fighting to uplift the underrepresented. Ricky has led voter registration drives, political campaigns, and programs to help the homeless.

Ricky's family, originally from Vicksburg, Mississippi, relocated to Wilmington, DE, where he was educated in the Wilmington public school system. He is a graduate of P.S. Dupont High School and attended Delaware Technical Community College and the University of Delaware. Ricky was a member of the United Auto Workers Union Local 1183 and worked at the Chrysler Corporation, retiring after 31 years.

He is married to his lovely wife, Armentha (Kay), and they have been blessed with two sons, Richard Jr. (deceased) and Ryan. His has been abundantly influenced by his godparents, the late Al O Plant, Sr., and the late Hazel D. Plant, who both served as State Representatives for the 2nd Representative District.

AWARD DESCRIPTION: Recognizes individuals who have made significant and sustained contributions to their community. These individuals have been active in their community for a significant number of years, impacting the individual lives of others.



JANE & LITTLETON MITCHELL AWARD WINNER: LIFE PATH CHURCH OF NEWARK

LifePath Church DE of Newark is a Jesus-centered congregation committed to making communities of disciples that reconnect people to Jesus, to one another, and to God's redemptive work in the world. Part of that mission is a commitment to pursuing racial justice as a church.

In early 2022, our emphasis on racial justice took shape with the formation of the Racial Justice Task Force, which sought opportunities to make racial justice a cornerstone of our identity. Their recommendations, presented to the congregation and the Vision Team in April 2022, were met with unanimous acceptance. These recommendations underscore three fundamental commitments:



encouraging dialogues on race, addressing potential obstacles to productive conversations, and integrating racial equity and justice into every aspect of church life.

LifePath Church's dedication to this journey is reflected in our range of activities, including book studies, adult sessions, community outreach, and the formation of a Racial Justice Compassion Team. We acknowledge the importance of fostering relationships with our immediate community, including the School Hill community and the town of Newark, all within a 5-mile radius of Las Americas Aspira Academy East Campus, where we gather. Our commitment is to be a positive force for change within our community.

Mary is a senior at Newark High School and President of the Greater Newark Youth Council. Elected in the spring of 2023, Mary jumped right in, helping to fundraise and serving as a delegate to the National NAACP Convention. She is also a member of NHS's Brother and Sisters Student Union (BASSU). She is involved in a multitude of activities, including Math League and Color Guard.

Also, she is a multi-sport athlete in her school's lacrosse, field hockey, and track teams. A musician herself, Mary can play the viola, violin, steel drums, and guitar. She's attended the Governor's School for Excellence for music (viola). She is also Newark High School's Business Professionals of America chapter secretary and placed in the top 5 in the Fundamental Spreadsheet Applications competition. She competed at the national leadership conference 3 years in a row. She is also a part of the newly formed Students Demand Action Delaware Chapter and is passionate about advocating for change. Mary plans to major in Information Systems or Computer Science in college and someday become the owner of a 100% gluten-free restaurant. One of her biggest life goals is to make a positive change in our society, give back to her community, and become an inspiration to Black youth.

LEADERSHIP AWARD ADULT NAACP WINNER: DR. FREEMAN L. WILLIAMS



Dr. Williams earned his Bachelor of Science Education degree, Master of Education degree, and Doctor of Educational Leadership degree from the University of Delaware. He was a University of Delaware basketball player from 1971-1973.

Dr. Williams is a former Christina school district superintendent, serving as a teacher, principal, director, assistant superintendent, and interim superintendent. Dr. Williams is also a former principal, acting superintendent, and assistant superintendent for the Appoquinimink school district.

Dr. Williams serves as the president of the Board for Neighborhood House, which provides counseling, early childhood education, and meal services. He is the president of the Newark Chapter of the NAACP and the vice president of the State of Delaware NAACP. Dr. Williams is a member of the University of Delaware Board of Trustees and a board member of the Newark Partnership. He serves on the University of Delaware Dean of Education Advisory Committee and the State of Delaware Pandemic Resurgence Advisory Committee. The Governor has appointed Dr. Williams to the State of Delaware Racial Equity Consortium. He serves on the Patient Advocacy Team for Pfizer Pharmaceutical Company.

Dr. Williams resides in Newark with his wife, Susan. He has three children and three grandchildren.

His favorite part of Newark is the historic African-American community that borders New London Road, and Cleveland Avenue called School Hill. This is the area where he grew up. Dr. Williams serves on the board of the Friends of School Hill.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD YOUTH WINNER: SYDNEY MCLEAN

Sydney is a remarkable young woman. My experience with her is through her work with Students Demand Action for Gun Safety in America; she has worked to start a statewide chapter of this national group in Delaware. After the shooting at the Christiana Mall in April of 2023, she gathered a group of friends and immediately started lobbying to end gun violence in Delaware. Since then, she has attended hearings in Legislative Hall, testified on



behalf of a handgun permitting bill, rallied with Moms Demand Action volunteers, and spoke with the Governor about improving gun safety in schools. She is viewed as a leader by her peers and legislators – multiple state senators and representatives have asked to meet with her because they see her ability to articulate what needs to be done. Sydney also cares deeply about her school community and is the kind of student who jumped in to do so when no one else was planning a Senior Sunrise activity for her class. She is generous with her time and resources; for her 18th birthday, she raised money to give presents to kids in need. I can't think of a better person to receive this award.



Marva continued to touch the lives of young minds as a substitute teacher at Caravel Academy, retiring for a second time following her mother's passing.

Sister Smith has been a member of the historic St John AM Church for over six decades. serving as the church clerk, welcoming every congregant with her infectious smile since 1969. Since 1975, Marva has been an esteemed member of the Elizabeth Boulden Temple #269 Order of Elks, now revered as a lifelong Daughter. The tapestry of Marva Bond-Smith's life is one of service, education, and unwavering devotion to the community.


